MEMBERSHIP COFFEE Field Trip to the NAC Ranch

Wednesday, August 10

There is absolutely no truth to the rumor that Cyclin' Shirley and her CruiserBabes rode their bikes naked through the Park City Christian Church during Sunday services and that's the reason we can't have our Monthly Coffee there. But it IS true that we are moving to the National Ability Center for August. The bad news: We can't serve coffee there. The good news: It's August and no one will want hot coffee anyway! But seriously, we don't have room to make and serve coffee, but we will offer an assortment of summertime beverages. (We do not -repeat NOT - define "summertime beverages" as margaritas, Tom Collins, G&Ts, or mojitos. But you get points for thinking that way.) Feel free to bring your own coffee if you need that mid-morning caffeine jolt.

After our regular meeting at the National Ability Center Ranch in Round Valley, NAC's Director will brief us on the Center and lead tours. We'll get to see campers on the ropes course, riding horses in the arena and practicing archery. The National Ability Center was formed in 1985 to provide disabled people of all ages and abilities with the opportunity to learn lifetime skills and participate in adaptive sports. NAC annually serves more than 2,000 participants who represent more than a hundred types of disabilities, including orthopedic, spinal cord, neuromuscular, visual, hearing impairment, cognitive, emotional and developmental. Several Newcomers already volunteer with the skiing and horseback riding programs, and volunteers are always welcome to these and the new Wounded Warrior programs.

The NAC Ranch is at 1000 Ability Way, near the Dog Park, Ice Sheet and Soccer Fields at Quinn's Junction. Turn off Highway 248 and follow the signs to NAC.

This is not the event to showcase your new stiletto flip-flops. Comfortable shoes for walking about the Ranch make a lot more sense.

Lunch will be at the Silver King Café at the nearby Park City Hospital. We promise that this will not be what you think of as "hospital food." But they just might serve green jello.

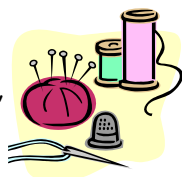

Mahjongg is a Chinese game that is played with tiles. But if you're a stickler for definitions, this is not true. Traditional Mahjongg tiles were made of bone (we're not sure whose bones were used for this and we hesitate to ask), often backed with bamboo. Bone tiles are still available, but it might be a good idea to ask whose bones they are. Most modern mahjongg sets are made of plastic, which would probably make the old Chinese ancestors flip around in their tombs. Yes, it's true: Modern Mahjongg tiles are made of bakelite, celluloid, and more recently nylon. The upper crust (of whom many live in Deer Valley) often play with tiles of ivory or jade, but these are exceedingly rare and some upper crust phonies try to pass off bone sets as ivory sets. Regardless of material, the symbols on the tiles are almost always engraved or pressed into the material and some expert players can determine the face value of their tiles by just feeling them.
